Keck School of Medicine of USC Primary Care Initiative



What is the Keck School of Medicine Primary Care Initiative (PCI)?

The PCI educates the campus community—students, faculty, residents and staff—about primary care through lectures, workshops, service, leadership, advocacy, and research.

Any interested Keck student may participate in PCI-sponsored activities, selectives, and electives.

What is the Keck School of Medicine Primary Care Program (PCP)?

The PCP is an educational track designed to increase the number of Keck medical students who enter community-based primary care—family medicine, geriatrics, internal medicine, ob/gyn, and pediatrics. Once they are accepted to the medical school, interested students can apply to the PCP.

The PCP offers accepted students:

- Longitudinal community clinic experiences that allow students to develop meaningful relationships with patients and preceptors
- Primary care-focused curriculum to complement the standard medical school curriculum
- Opportunities for research, advocacy and leadership in primary care
- Mentorship from primary care faculty
- A community of like-minded peers

Curriculum Highlights

First and second year PCP students participate in:

- Teaching nutrition and exercise classes in the community
- Working with an interprofessional team of students to learn about care for older adults

Additional opportunities include experiences in:

- Lactation
- Needle exchange programs
- Tattoo removal clinic
- Pain management
